

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TO THE READER

TUDENTS WILL KNOW that the Reformation began when Martin Luther nailed his "Ninety-Five Theses" to a church door in 1517. While reading *Renegade*, a graphic novel about Luther, I realized that this format would be a great way to tell a lesserknown and far more dramatic part of Reformation history, the story of the Anabaptists of the Radical Reformation. These Reformers were more daring than Luther and faced intense persecution for their beliefs at the hands of both Catholic and Protestant authorities. Their courage and vision helped establish goals that we still aspire to today: economic justice, peaceful social reform, and freedom of conscience.

So I began seriously researching the Anabaptist movement, which started in the Swiss city of Zurich in 1525. (Their enemies called them Anabaptists, or "rebaptizers," because they didn't recognize infant baptism – one had to choose to become a Christian.) I read dozens of books and traveled to locations in Europe including the street where Felix Manz lived, a cave where he may have hidden, and the place where he was drowned.

The title comes from an early Anabaptist text describing the punishments threatening anyone who was rebaptized: along with torture and loss of property both men and women faced execution "by water, by fire, or by sword." All named characters in this book are historical figures, and the plot follows documentary sources, though some scenes have been imaginatively recreated.

THE ANABAPTIST STORY IS PERSONAL FOR ME. I belong to the Bruderhof, a Christian community that practices the biblical tenets of early Anabaptism such as believers' baptism, community of goods, and conscientious objection to military service. And I married Doris Waldner, who has Hutterite roots; her ancestors have been living a life of sharing and nonviolence in Christian community for centuries. They were driven from one land to another and eventually fled Russia during the 1870s when the tsar threatened to force them into the military. My wife's family settled in what is now South Dakota, where Hutterites still live and work together today. Preserving her heritage and presenting it to our children has been an inspiration throughout this project.

I would like to thank my coauthors Sankha Banerjee and Richard Mommsen for their teamwork throughout the process, and Casey Kurtti and Oriol Malet for their editorial contributions.


Dauntless conviction was one of the marks of the first Anabaptists. I hope this book inspires you to stand up boldly and firmly for what you know is right and true.


